When children in affluent countries attend school, they typically don't have to be concerned that they will arrive in their classrooms and have to sit on the floor because the school district can't afford seats. Those of us in places like the U.S., Canada, and Great Britain sometimes take seats and desks in school for granted because we have never had to live without them. While as a young child it's often fun to sit on the floor to listen to a story, work on a puzzle, or play a game, generally in this situation, the youngster is sitting on a comfortable carpet, pillow, or beanbag.

Life in Haiti is different. Year after year, some students sit on the dirt or cement floor in a roughly built schoolroom. Boys and girls must frequently walk quite far to school, so knowing that they can rest their weary feet by sitting down on a seat when they arrive would give them hope in their journey. They would no doubt be more productive too.

One Starfish Kids-sponsored school recently received benches built with a writing surface. This school, School of God, is in Petit Bourg and has an enrollment of 192 students. Eight percent of the students are sponsored through SFK. As the truck toting the benches drove along the bumpy road to make the delivery, schoolchildren from neighboring schools were really excited to see the benches, yelling for the truck to stop and provide worktables to them because their schools need them as well.

As the truck pulled up to School of God, the children curiously watched the team unload their newly built wooden benches. Boys and girls smiled brightly in unison as they imagined coming to school each day and using their brand new benches.

There is a phrase that says, "All is fish that comes to his net." In other words, "He makes use of everything that comes his way. "Blessing a school in Haiti with benches correlates with this saying, because not only will the benches be used for school, but for church, Sunday school, and meetings.

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When benches are purchased for a school, they not only support the children, but many people in the community. Please consider purchasing a bench for \$100. It's a great way to see your dollars go the extra mile for a disadvantaged area in Haiti, and it's a simple way to transform a life through your generosity.
